



Admission Requirements

Academic performance in your previous studies is the main determining factor for admission to Carleton's undergraduate degree programs.

Secondary school (high school) graduation is the normal level required for admission to the first year of an undergraduate program.

Admission requirements vary by program, so depending on your program of choice you may also be required to present specific subjects (prerequisites). See the chart on pages 6 and 7 for the prerequisite subjects needed for each degree program.

We recognize and accept national qualifications from most countries. For some countries, applicants may be required to have completed one year of university study. If your education system is not listed here or on the website, or if you need further information, please email us at international@carleton.ca.

How to apply

To see the specific admission requirements for your chosen degree program from the education system you have completed, please visit admissions.carleton.ca/apply.

We operate on a rolling admission timeline which means that the sooner your application and documents are received, the sooner we can process your application.

English language requirements

For admission, you will need to demonstrate that your knowledge and use of English are strong enough for studies in an English language university.

You can do this by:

- Demonstrating that you have studied for the last three years (full-time) in a high school, college, or university in Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom or any other country in which the primary language is English and where the language of instruction in the relevant institution was exclusively English
- Submitting an English as a Second Language (ESL) test result

Depending on the score achieved, you may receive:

 Admission with no ESL requirement: Begin your full-time undergraduate degree studies.

If your language test score falls below the ranges listed in table 2, or you do not submit a language test, you will not be eligible for an offer of admission. You can retake a language test and submit a higher score to be considered for admission.

Undergraduate Entrance Scholarships

Undergraduate Entrance Scholarships are automatically offered to all high school students who meet our academic and language requirements.

The scholarship amount is based on the applicant's previous academic performance. These merit-based scholarships are **renewable**, meaning that if they are lost in one year, they can be regained in future years. Scholarships are renewable with an A- standing (annual GPA of 10.0).

Prestige Scholarships

Our highest awards are our 24 Prestige Scholarships. Students must apply, and are considered only if entering Carleton directly from high school with an admission average of 90 per cent or better. The selection committee will also assess the range of community or secondary school extracurricular activities.

The values of the Prestige Scholarships range from \$5,000 to \$7,500 CAD per year and they are renewable based on maintaining a minimum A- (10.0 GPA) in full-time studies.

An application is required. Deadline: March 1.

Specialized Scholarships

Check the Awards website for any specialized scholarships, including The Law Scholarship in Architectural Studies, which is a \$10,000 scholarship awarded annually to an outstanding full-time undergraduate international student entering the Bachelor of Architectural Studies. Eligible students must be admitted from a high school in China/Hong Kong. An application is required.

Co-op and career opportunities

Over time, Carleton has built strong connections in the high-tech sector, and with local industry leaders and research scientists, creating many valuable work opportunities for students.

"Co-op" = paid work experience

The majority of Carleton's undergraduate programs include a co-operative education option (known as "co-op"). Study terms alternate with paid, full-time work terms that are directly related to your program of study. Students can gain 12 to 16 months of work experience during their degree. Typically an additional year of study is required to complete the co-op option.

Some benefits of participating in the co-op program:

- Learn essential job search skills and build your professional network
- Put theory into practice and solve real world problems in your field of study
- Develop professional skills that employers are looking for
- Explore different career environments to find your best fit
- · Earn money to help with tuition costs

Co-operative Education Office

The co-op office supports you with your job search, facilitates the hiring process and develops connections with potential employers. You can apply to the co-op program when you apply for your degree program at Carleton, or you can apply later in your studies (typically at the end of first or second year). Students beginning their degrees with an English language requirement will also complete an additional language test in order to participate in co-op. Carleton offers assistance to international students needing the co-op work permit and Canadian social insurance number required for co-op placements.

Salaries range from minimum wage (\$14/hour) to \$30/hour depending on the program. Salary averages are outlined on our website per field of study. Students usually work 35 to 40 hours per week during a co-op term.



Working in Canada

Most international students studying full-time can:

- Apply for a job on campus at Carleton University
- Apply for a part-time job off campus during the school year (20 hours per week maximum)
- Apply for full-time work during scheduled breaks (such as reading week, summer break)
- Apply for a work permit after you graduate (for up to three years) to gain Canadian work experience

Traditional or suite-style rooms

The majority of our rooms for first-year students are traditional double rooms, with shared washroom facilities. A limited number of single rooms are available for first-year students.

The suite style provides four-person suites (either two doubles or four singles) with a shared common area, washroom facility and small food preparation area (with fridge and microwave).


First-year residence guarantee

At Carleton, a double traditional room is guaranteed to all new, first-year students entering directly from high school—provided they receive an offer of admission on or before May 15.

To confirm your space:

- Accept your offer of admission
- · Accept the residence offer
- . Pay the deposit by June 8

If you do not qualify for a guaranteed space in residence, you can still apply for a space through the lottery process: housing.carleton.ca/applying-to-residence

All Access Meal Plan

First-year students living in residence will be enrolled in the All Access Meal Plan, which provides unlimited entry into the dining hall and \$100 Dining Dollars, for use across campus.

For students living in suite-style residences, there is also a Reduced Meal Plan option, which offers ten meals per week and \$300 Dining Dollars.

The residence dining hall sources food locally, accommodates dietary needs and offers an "all you care to eat" experience featuring a variety of meals cooked right in front of you.

Carleton's newly renovated, on-campus healthcare facility provides medical and counselling services, a resource centre and a health promotion program for the Carleton community.




